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Sovereign Like Never Before

Russian President Vladimir Putin has repeatedly claimed that Ukraine does not exist. He denies the country its sovereignty, its own culture, and the freedom to decide for itself who its allies should be. According to Putin's view, a Ukrainian state can only exist in "partnership" with Russia.

A partnership always requires at least two consenting parties. But what happens when one of the two is vehemently against that partnership? And if the other insists on being "partners" anyway? What if one "partner" is much more powerful and starts a war to unilaterally enforce the so-called "partnership"? Then it is called imperialism, at least according to the classical definition. What the Russian government is trying to do is subjugate a supposedly weaker neighbor.

Putin ended his pamphlet *On the Historical Unity of Russians and Ukrainians* with the sentence: "And what Ukraine will be – it is up to its citizens to decide." The Ukrainian people have done exactly that! Twice now. The first time was when all of Ukraine's oblasts voted for independence in 1991 – including Crimea, by the way. The second time, the decision was even clearer.

This time, it wasn't a vote that demonstrated just how much Ukrainians believe in their country. Instead, it's their determined and committed opposition to the Russian war of aggression. Throughout history, having a united enemy has often brought the people of a nation together. This

case is no different. The Ukrainian army is fighting back, Ukrainian politicians are fighting back, the Ukrainian people are fighting back – since the invasion, there is cohesion like never before.

Ukraine is made up of an independent and sovereign population. Ukrainians have been aware of this for a long time. By deciding to invade Ukraine, Putin has disproven his own theories. What's more, he has put the Ukrainian people's self-determination and understanding of themselves as sovereign and self-confident before the eyes of the world. Ukraine has proven that it will not surrender without a fight and that Putin is wrong – Ukraine does not belong to Russia. Putin has created Ukrainian heroes and has made Ukrainian independence a more visible movement than anyone before. The entire world is now aware: Ukraine is its own nation.

This book provides at least 100 pieces of evidence for Ukrainian identity, showing many of its aspects, peculiarities, and problems. It offers proof of the existence of a separate nation with its own culture and self-image – more independent and sovereign than ever!

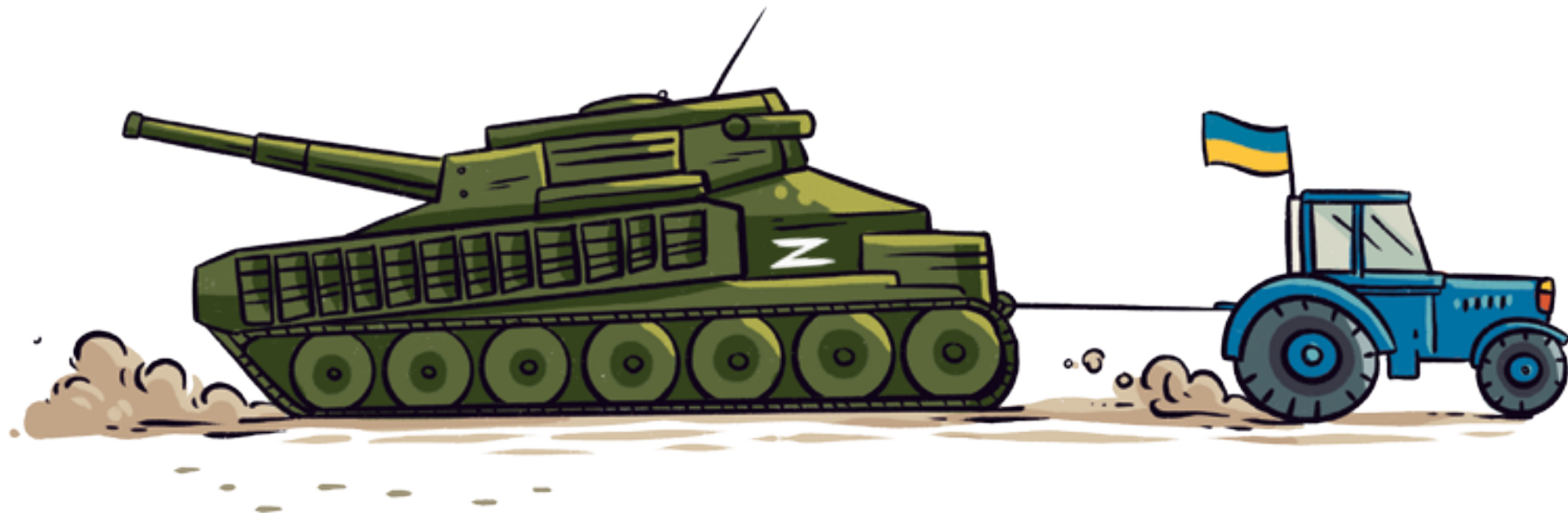

Tanks vs. Tractors

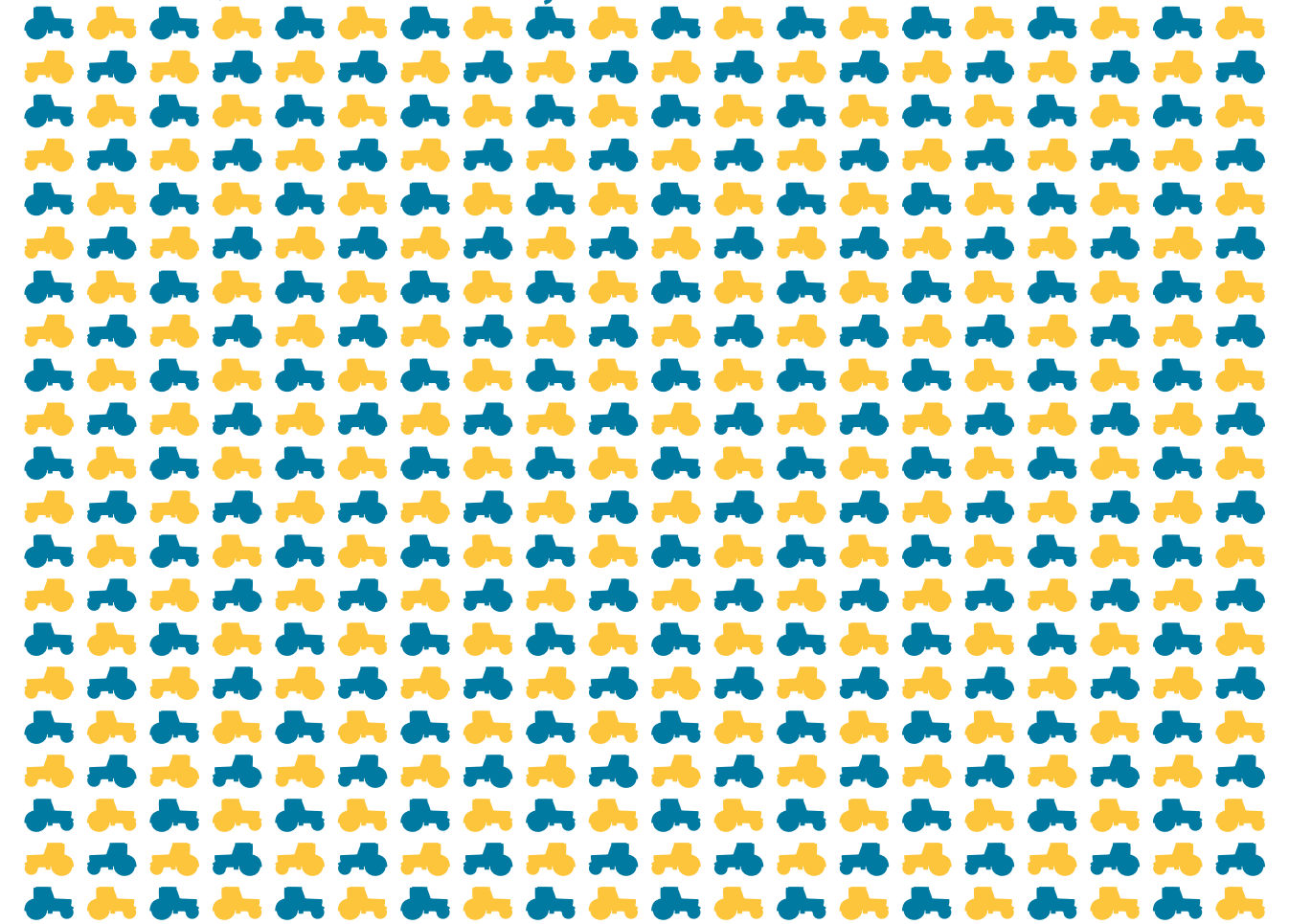
Since the first days of the Russian invasion in February 2022, reports, photos, and videos have been circulating of Ukrainian farmers stealing Russian tanks. In some cases, they are said to have simply hauled them away with their tractors. Whether all of these stories are true is

impossible to verify entirely, however, some of them definitely sound at least pretty conclusive. If we consider Ukrainian tractors as some sort of military vehicle, comparing their numbers with that of Russian tanks seems only reasonable. Now, only one question remains: who has more?

Before the war, Russia had over **12,420 tanks**



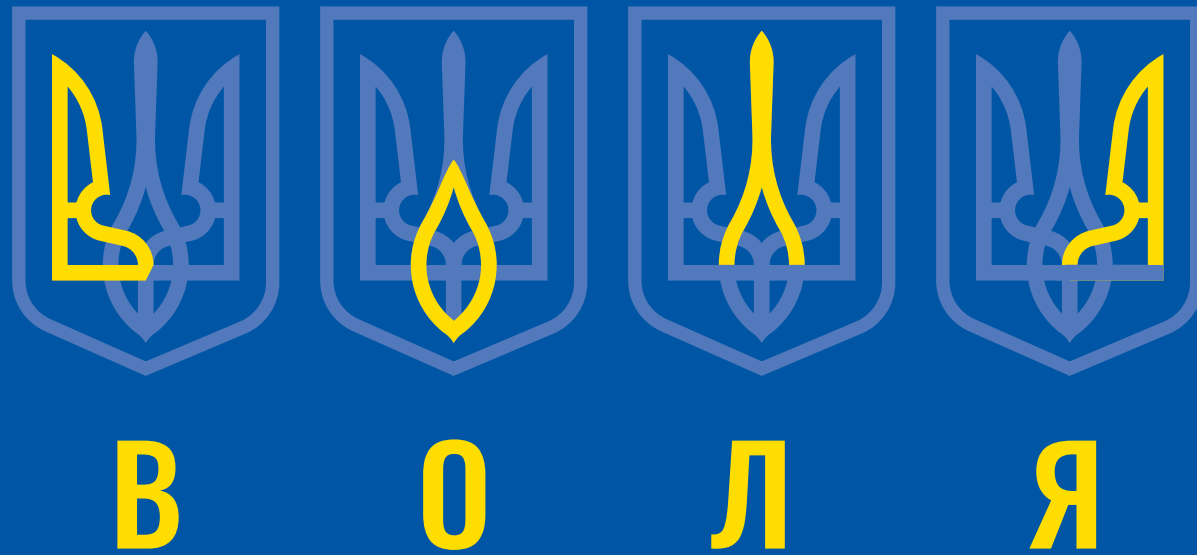
In Ukraine, there are **425,689 tractors**

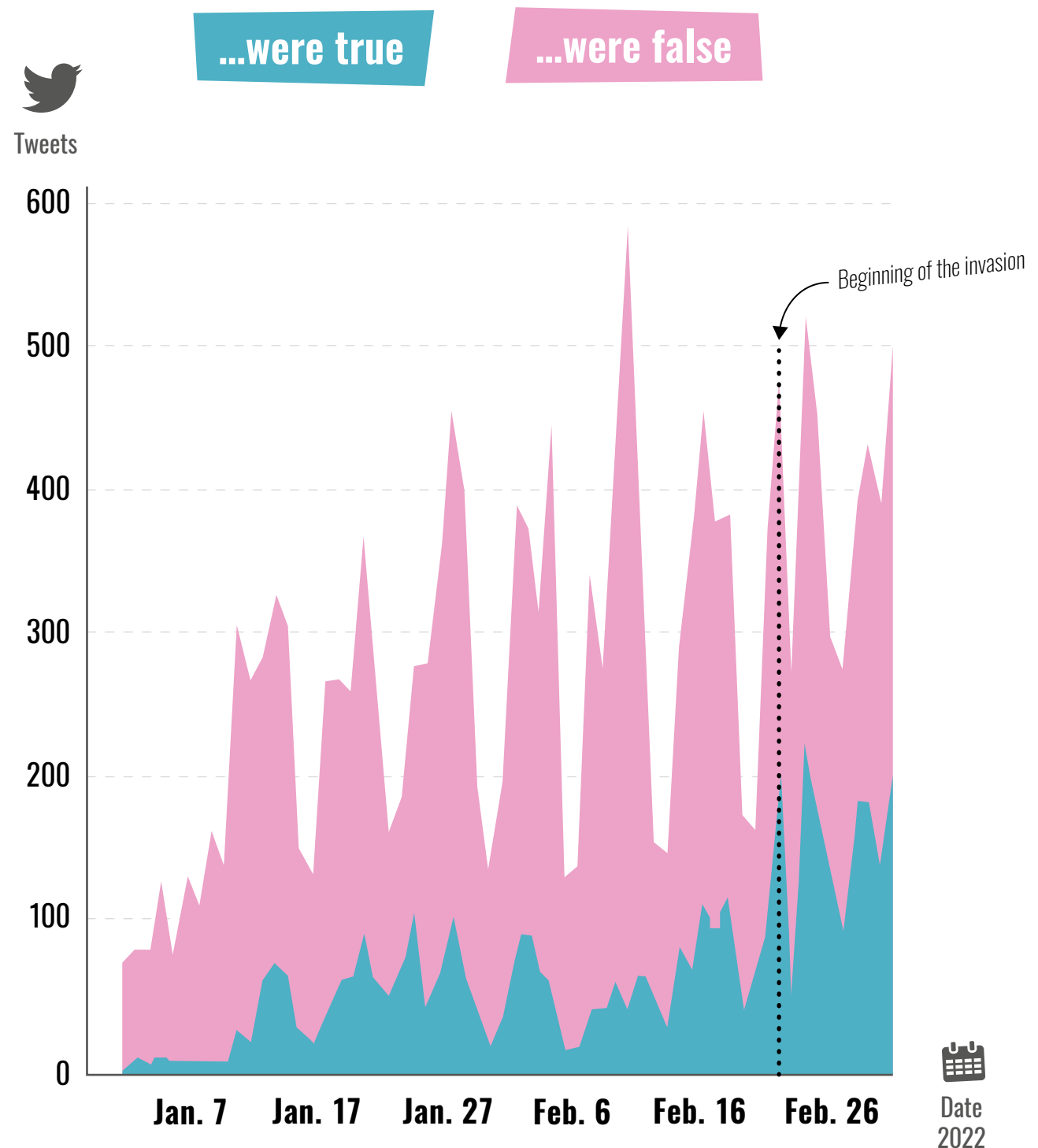
The Coat of Arms of Ukraine

The Tryzub – which translates to “trident” – has been through a lot. It’s Ukraine’s most important symbol and was first coopted by the Nazis in the Second World War, before being completely banned by the Soviet Union. Nowadays, it can be found on bank notes, postage stamps, and of course, on the Ukrainian flag. In school, Ukrainian kids today learn that there is a hidden word if you look closely: freedom.

Preparing for the War: Spreading Fake News

According to a study, there are 75 official Russian government accounts which are largely responsible for the spread of false information. Between February 25th and March 3rd, 2022, they tweeted 1,175 times. Three quarters of the information posted was about Ukraine, much of which sought to justify the Russian invasion. They were retweeted a total of 36 million times, got 30 million likes, and received about 4 million replies.

Countries Which Have Officially Recognized the Holodomor as a Genocide...

At the beginning of the 1930's, an estimated six to eleven million Ukrainians starved. The Soviet Union leadership under Joseph Stalin was responsible for this. At the time, the dictator was particularly worried about Ukrainian independence movements. He thought they were the reason for the low yields of grain given by Ukrainian farmers. How did Stalin plan to fix this problem? By raising food taxes and arresting and shooting Ukrainians. In short: genocide. Today, this is called the Holodomor which translates to "death by hunger." Thirteen percent of the Ukrainian population were killed in the Holodomor. And no one was allowed to talk about it for fifty years. The Soviet Union wanted

to banish the collective memory of the genocide by enforcing strict silence surrounding the topic. The Holodomor is considered one of the greatest humanitarian tragedies of the 20th century – which many have never even heard of.

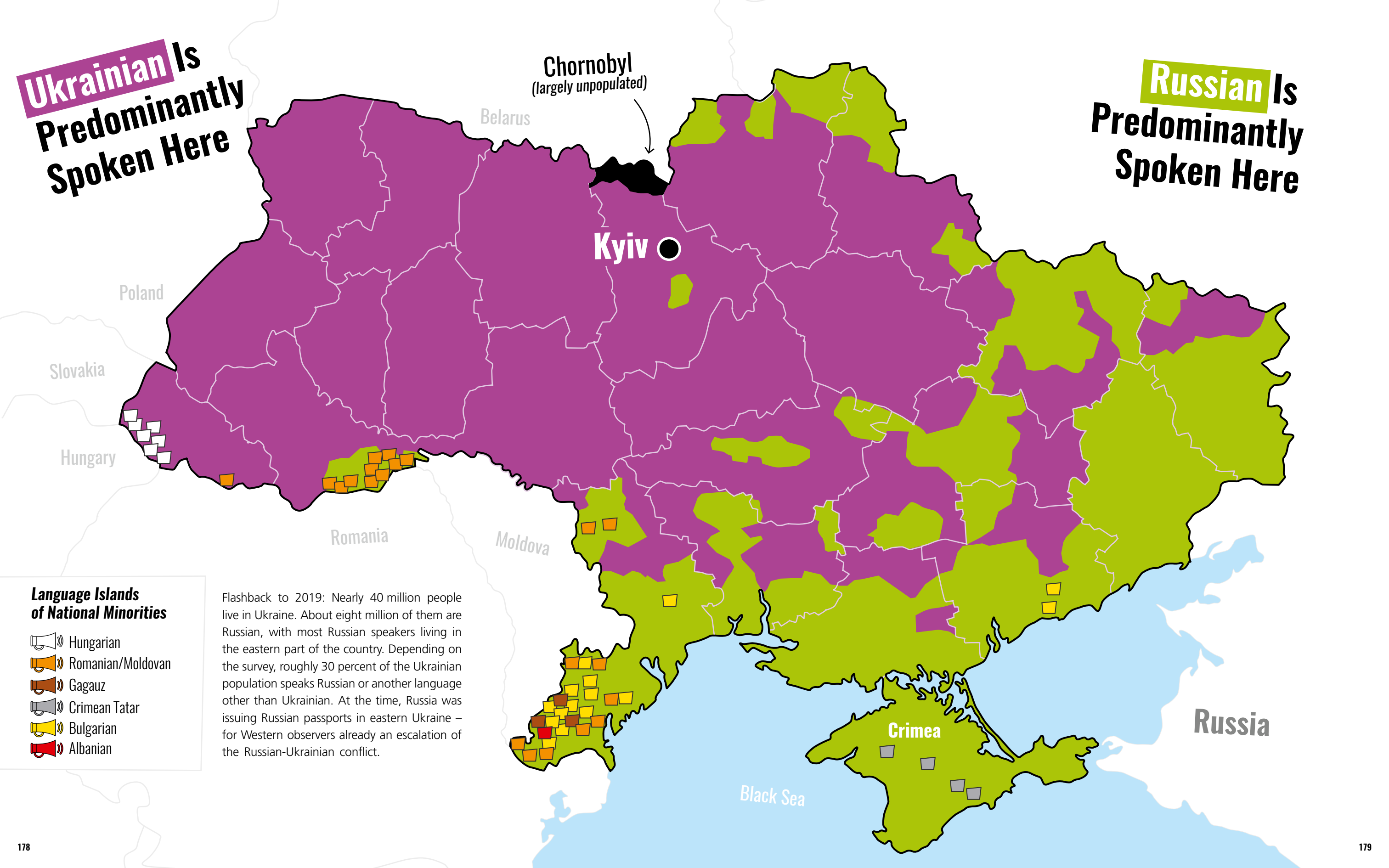
